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## SYMPOSIUM '81 IN DALLAS: THE KEYNOTE WORD WAS 'OVERFLOW'

In retrospect, the word that best describes Symposium '81, held this past August, in Dallas, TX is 'overflow'.

Firstly, there was an overflow of worshippers, from every part of North America, crowding into Shady Grove Church for a week of Worship, Word, and Workshop. An all-time Symposium 'high', of 350 registered delegates came, from 23 states, Canada and Mexico, representing 101 different local churches. The South-Central U.S., a region under-represented in past Symposium gatherings, contributed the majority of delegates: Texas sent 140; Kansas, 33; Arkansas, 32; and 32 came from Missouri.

Secondly, there was an overflow of beautiful new songs from every region of the country. Not every delegate had time to share their new material during the 2 'songsharing sessions', but we at Zionsong are happy to present much of the 'overflow' music in this Fall, 1981 issue.

Thirdly, there was a rich overflow of God's Word. Pastor Graham Truscott, from San Diego, CA, brought forth a powerful word on Christian Commitment (excerpts are on the Fall '81 cassette); Charlotte Baker did not disappoint us with her prophetic messages, concluding with a stirring exhortation to make spiritual warfare against the heavenlies through music, dance, marching, and other 'intercessory' forms of expression. A flock of new workshop teachers made their Symposium debuts: Robbie Carder of Little Rock, AR, Dan Gardner of Clawson, MI, Joni Miller of Oakland, CA, and many others.

Fourthly, there was an overflow of great hospitality and friendship from the people of Shady Grove Church. The ultimate in hospitality was the Friday evening banquet and service held high atop the Dallas Cowboys' ultra-modern Texas Stadium, where nearly 500 feasted on a Texas-style barbeque of chicken and ribs, in the Stadium's Banquet Hall. Diners could gaze across the stadium to the electronic scoreboard, which was flashing such exhortations as 'Sing A New Song Unto the Lord', while the football team, the Dallas Cowboys, were scrimmaging on the astroturf below. It was a grandiose Texas conclusion to Symposium '81...a climax that will be hard to top, by future conference hosts. Our special thanks go to Pastor Griffing and to his wife, Sybil, who organized the delicious buffet luncheons.

Fifth, and most importantly, there was a lavish overflow of heartfelt, spirit-inspired worship of the Lord Jesus Christ. From start to finish, it was the singers, orchestra, dancers and drama department of Shady Grove, the host church, which provided the continuous flow of worship, throughout the *Symposium*. This 'flow' started Tuesday evening, August 4th, with Warren Hastings leading worship and ministering his composition, 'Worthy, Worthy', along with his topnotch vocal ensemble. It concluded Friday evening, August 7th, with Kirk Dearman leading the delegates in his composition, 'Commune

With Me', (arrangement by Don Fleming, Bible Temple, Portland, OR), accompanied by the mass orchestra and by three dancers, symbolizing the cherubim upon the mercy seat, and an approaching worshipper. It was a sublime and holy moment.

It has been more than two months since Symposium '81, and yet, hundreds of us still bask in the 'shekinah' afterglow of this lifechanging gathering. There has been an overflow of the expression of thanks unto the Lord for the ministry of Symposium '81. Tom Elie, chief musician at the 3,000 member Jesus People Church of Minneapolis, writes that Symposium '81 'totally revolutionized and renewed my feelings toward worshipping the Lord.' John Smith, who pastors, along with his brother Richard, Landmark Bible Church in Phoenix, AZ, states: 'We are so very grateful for the Symposium. We just can't get over it. We are home! We feel so very comfortable with all the concepts and techniques. I rejoice to find others also teaching restoration truths and Tabernacle-of-David praise and worship. (Pastor Smith has submitted a more thorough Symposium '81 report, which is included in this issue of 'Music Notes'). There have also been countless requests for much of the featured Symposium music, such as Kirk Dearman's 'We Bring the Sacrifice of Praise', which we have enclosed in this issue of Zionsong. Also, in these few short weeks since Symposium, there has been an overflow of regional praise gatherings and worship conferences (see article), with many more in the planning stage.

In conclusion, ZionSong wishes to acknowledge the superb Job done by Conference Host, Warren Hastings and his wife Jan, and Registrar, Sue Mast. Warren's motto for Symposium '81 proved to be prophetic: we were truly, 'swept along in the Flow of God.'

We'll see you in Detroit, for Symposium '82, as we continue to drink in, from the overflow of the River of God.

# **'SYMPOSIUM '82' TO BE HOSTED BY DETROIT'S ZION EVANGELISTIC TEMPLE**

Zion Song has learned that Pastor Leonard Gardner has accepted the invitation of the Symposium Steering Committee to host the 1982 conference in his church, Zion Evangelistic Temple, located in Clawson, MI, just north of Detroit. The steering committee also voted to extend Symposium by one day (not to add more activities, but to make the whole schedule more relaxed), and to always invite at least two senior pastors from different parts of the country to be of support to the Symposium Host Pastor.

Zion Evangelistic Temple is a fellowship that has unabashedly made the exuberant public worship of Jesus their #1 church priority. As a result, it is one of the fastest-growing churches in the nation. Despite having a modern and spacious sanctuary, which holds 2,000 worshipers, Zion has found it necessary to go to two Sunday morning services. The Sunday evening and mid-week services are strictly 'SRO'. The church has just undertaken a weekly T.V. ministry and

has recently purchased acreage for an expanded facility to be built in the northern suburbs of Detroit, by 1984.

ZionSong members are well acquainted with the prolific songwriting ministry of Dan Gardner, the pastor's son and music minister at Zion Evangelistic Temple. He has a strong worshipleading ministry, and shepherds a choir of 60, and an orchestra of 30. He also has oversight of Zion's strong ministry in drama, dance, and expressive movement, as well as their day-school music program. He has experience as a record producer and now, as a T.V. producer. Zion's original musical, 'Ark and the Dove', has been videotaped, and the Lord is using it as an anointed, yet entertaining, teaching tool, across the nation. Despite the busy doings at Zion, it is a fellowship famous for hospitality. Dan and his charming wife, Joanne, will host you regally, next August.

Dear Musicians in Christ,
